I have been in my role as the Activities and Day Centre Coordinator at Alfriston for a year now, and during that time I have learned a huge amount (including 20+ different ways people want their tea!) Organising Activities at the Day Centre is about more than just keeping people entertained, or filling time. Research studies have shown that a reduction in activity is not always due to natural ageing processes, and is more often due to a lack of facilities and funding that

help provide accessible activities for Older People.

A report from the Alzheimer's Society showed that 50% of carers felt their relatives did not have enough to occupy them during the day. Increased activity and engagement can have a positive effect on quality of life and contribute to other important outcomes including mortality rates. Research also shows that inactivity and low levels of engagement lead to loss of physical function, social isolation, behavioural symptoms and poor quality of life.

Things like Bingo, singing, dancing, are fun activities at their heart, but they also have an important function in promoting health. The hope is that by providing a safe place for older people to attend, they are still able to meet their social needs, as well as their need for mental and physical activity.
